◆Hot Economy, Cold Politics (relationship with China)

. e.g., ringing China-Japan trade, Japanese investment in China, Overseas Development Assistance.

. “History” Issue-Apology (Murayama, Obuchi, Koizumi), Koizumi visits to Yasukuni Shrine, Textbooks/Education

Strategic rivalry, Transnational issues.

◆Cautions in Political-Economic Relations

- Japanese investments in China smaller in size compared to other markets (i.e. W. Europe, N. America, Singapore), despite the large cumulative sum.
- ODA loan approval declining since late-1990s, loans due to terminate by 2008, shifting to environmental/humanitarian assistance
- No official FTA talk between CHN and JPN
- Trilateral Investment Pact being discussed (w/ROK)

◆Two Koreas()

- North Korea
 - Nuclear Weapons and Ballistic Missiles Development
 - Abductions and Spy Activities
 - State-Sponsored Criminal/Terror Activities
- South Korea
 - Close Economic Ties, but increasing trade with China
 - National Unification considerations conflicting with US/JPN priorities in N. Korea matters
 - Reverse Course from KDJ to RMH?

◆SE Asia

- **Drivers of Foreign Policy (Japan)**
 - Arena of Diplomatic Rivalry with China
 - Investments
 - Maritime Security
- **Drivers of Foreign Policy (ASEAN)**
 - Balancing other major powers (China, U.S., India, Australia)
 - Compete against China in luring Japanese investments

◆Australia-Japan

- Two anchors”—Close U.S. allies
- Growing, yet limited, bilateral and trilateral security cooperation
- Economic relations—compatibility (quality), asymmetry (quantity)
 - Farm-sector trade issues
 - WTO and FTA negotiating stances
 - AU's growing economic ties with China

◆India-Japan

- Positive WW2 legacy and unique relations during the Cold War
- Easing of the U.S.-India relations and its limits
- India-China relations
- Potential, yet still relatively insignificant economic ties
- India's nuclear weapons
